About Sakshara

Sakshara Trust was registered on 18 February 2019 as a private discretionary charitable trust under the provisions of Indian Trusts Act, 1882, primarily for facilitating literacy and skill development among Indian residents. The hope is that with these skills, beneficiaries can generate income for themselves and improve the quality of their lives. Indian residents should be empowered to exercise their right to control, and benefit from, their assets, income and resources with a positive impact on the environment.

Sakshara's Vision

All people will be literate and possess skills that enable them to sustain their livelihood.

Sakshara exists to provide literacy and other skills to enhance a person's quality of life and allow them to contribute effectively in the society they live in.

Note from the Trustees

Sakshara Trust started as a dream in 2016 and finally became reality in 2019. Getting off to a slow start in 2019-20, the first wave of the pandemic brought a stop to a lot of our planned activities. After a year of consolidation rather than implementation in 2021-22, it was hoped that we would have more activities lined up in the new financial year, but that is when the nation was hit by a second wave of the pandemic which proved to be more devastating than the earlier wave. We somehow continued with our work, conducting English conversations for adults online, and teaching handiwork skills to three ladies who could work from their homes. The 'Woollens for Babies' project continued without a hitch, thanks to some very willing volunteers of the Nool Koota. Meanwhile, in the first quarter of 2021-22, Sakshara received the provisional approval under section 80G of the Income Tax Act.

We end the year on a very positive note. Fifteen Sakshara volunteers started teaching the children in the Government Primary School in Anchepalya in Bengaluru, ensuring that the children made up for the gap in education caused by the shortage of classes in the past two years. Talks are also taking place for skill-building classes with the parents of these children in the school premises.

We look forward, with hope, to an activity-filled fruitful year ahead.

Programmes

Currently Sakshara conducts activities under 2 broad programme heads:

- Reading for Literacy
- Acquiring income-generating skills

Reading for Literacy

We added to our collection of learning material from Pratham and from other educators like Jane Sahi, and also created flash cards in Kannada for adult learners.

15 years after dropping out of school, Shalini, one of our beneficiaries, was registered for the Class X Karnataka State Board examinations in Kannada medium as a private student. She appeared for her examinations in March/April, and we are hopeful that she will do well. She received a lot of support from Sakshara volunteers Amrut, Sujatha, Sindhu and Sandhya. We are very grateful to Ms Soumya Ponnappa, the Head Mistress of Kengeri Government School, for all her support in ensuring that Shalini could appear for her examinations.

Shalini says, "I am glad I could take the Xth Board examinations. More than worrying about passing, I am so grateful that I have been able to learn so much".

Educational support

Sakshara reached out to Mr Sampath Kumar, the Headmaster of the Government Primary School at Anchepalya, offering our support for the school children. The school had only 4 Government teachers in charge of the education of the 230 children enrolled in the school. Mr Kumar mentioned that they were in urgent need of teachers to help with the children.

Fifteen residents of Good Earth Malhar, a residential community located just a kilometre away from the Anchepalya School, offered their services as teachers. From the first week of December, Sakshara volunteers started teaching English. Science, Hindi and Mathematics to children in classes 6 and 7, and Mathematics and English to children in classes 3, 4 and 5.

Sakshara is very grateful to these amazing people who took time off from their regular routines to teach the children twice or thrice a week for an hour. We aim to make this an on-going programme, and we look forward to very rewarding sessions with the children.

While textbooks for the children were provided by the Government of Karnataka, the children needed notebooks and stationery. On our request, ITC Ltd. supplied notebooks, pens, pencils, sketch pens and geometry boxes to the 230 children of the School. notebooks and pens were distributed before the examinations in March and the rest of the donated stationery will be done when the school reopens for the new academic session in May 2022.

Financial support for students

Sakshara Trust has undertaken to provide financial support for the education for 2 needy students, Vishal and Alex, by paying a part of their school fees, while their parents undertake to pay the balance.

We hope to support a total of 5 children in the coming year, and depending on funds available, will add to this number in the future.

Conversation/Literacy Classes

5 young working people attended online classes (both text and audio) over Whatsapp to improve their English conversation skills. The classes over Whatsapp did have some challenges. With offices opening up, these young people have had to go back to work, and the classes had to be stopped. We are still figuring out how to continue the classes remotely.

Acquiring income-generating skills

Shalini, who learnt to knit and crochet two years ago, continued to build on her skills and learnt to crochet bookmarks and coasters. While she is adding to her income by selling crochet products, she has also become an efficient teacher for others who wish to crochet. With Shalini's help, our newest beneficiary Meena is also making amigurumi toys and baby blankets.

Nikki, who is on the cover of this report, is a young beneficiary from Kolkata and already had some basic crochet skills. She learnt to make granny squares and is busy adding to her income by making woollen baby blankets. The yarn is provided by Sakshara, and discussions about design happen through Whatsapp video chats.

Thanks to the Nool Koota, our friends who came together to knit and crochet woollens, work on our 'Keep our babies warm' project continued without interruption despite the pandemic and lockdowns. We sent over 40 sets of woollen sweaters, caps, bootees and sheets for premature babies to the <u>Jan Chetana Manch</u> in Jharkhand. A special thanks goes out to Ms Namita Guha Roy, an octogenarian knitter, who has also been a huge contributor.

Sakshara beneficiaries and Nool Koota volunteers got together to make the coasters, and Good Earth compensated Sakshara generously for this project, ensuring that we could pick up more yarn and other supplies for the handiwork sessions.
